





# When asked about their overall sentiment towards the economy, 60% of CEOs were "Optimistic" or "Very Optimistic" about the Georgia economy.

What is your personal outlook towards the following over the next 12 months?



CEOs were similarly positive about their industry's performance in Georgia, with 66% being "Optimistic" or "Very Optimistic."

This contrasts with their view of the US economy. Only 32% were "Optimistic" or "Very Optimistic" regarding the US economy.



# When asked to rank issues affecting the future of Georgia's economy, most CEOs were concerned with human capital and infrastructure

Environmental impacts and creating a diverse and equitable workforce are the least prioritized issues for CEOs when thinking about Georgia's future economy.






Most CEOs ranked "Reducing Negative Impact to the Environment" as the least important issue for Georgia's future economy. Of the CEOs who ranked this issue in their top 3 concerns, 50% were CEOs from small businesses (0-24 employees).



# Over half of CEOs - 58% - are currently experiencing workforce shortages. On average, CEOs indicated a need to increase their workforce by 6%.

Of the 58% of CEOs that are experiencing workforce shortages, 82% were headquartered within the state, which nearly matches the overall percentage of businesses headquartered in GA across the entire survey (85%).

# **Driving Trends**

**Job Growth:** By 2050, 3.1 Million new jobs will be created, or a 46% increase from today.

**Population Growth:** By 2050 Georgia's population will grow by 2.5 million people to just under 13.4 million calling Georgia home.

**Workforce Participation:** Nearly 40%, or roughly 3.2 million, of working age Georgians are not engage in the workforce.

Carrer Training: 40% of high school students have not completed career trainings by graduation

**Regulatory Barriers:** 1 in 6 jobs in Georgia require an occupational license and 1 in 4 Georgias high demand Carrers require a license

#### Compared to similar regions across the US

- Higher veteran and retiree population
- Lower millennial population

#### **2040 Population**

- Significant Hispanic and Asian population growth
- Decline in ages 0 to 19, and 20 to 29

Poverty Rate: 18.6%

Some college and technical training: 22%





# **Early Learning**

#### **Enrollment Trends**

- 50% of our youngest children are not enrolled in public pre-school programs.
- Georgia's Pre-K enrollment declined from 60% in 2019 to 49% in 2021
- 2,592 kids on the AY 2021 Wait List

#### **Economic Considerations**

- Georgia's labor force participation rate hovers at 61%
- In 2021, 29% of children lived in a cost burdened household





# **Early Learning**

#### **National Trends**

- State funded Pre-K programs have nearly doubled from 2002 to 2016
- Head Start enrollment fell by 30% nationally from 2019 to 2021
- 35 states have public Pre-K programs which enroll children as early as 3 years old





## K-12 Education

#### Literacy

 Currently, students in our states metro school district have the highest share of proficiency at 46.7% with students in our rural communities having the lowest rate of proficiency at 33.4%



- Higher Graduation Rates than Non-CTAE students
- 40% of High School grads don't graduates with career training

#### **Education Workforce**

- 89.2% of teachers are retained within the state after degree completion, with the highest rates being Pre-k teachers at 92.4%.
- Teacher attrition in Georgia- 78% leave formally, 11.5% teachers leave due to retirement and 5.2% leave to accept another education position

#### **Georgia Match**

- 12,000 Georgia Students have taken the next steps as a part of the program






# **Higher Education**

#### **Technical College System of Georgia**

- Enrollment has increased by 2.2% since AY 2021
- 25% of students in AY 2023 are Dual Enrolled
- 45% of students are considered economically disadvantaged

#### High Demand Careers Initiative

- First state-funded apprenticeship program
- Provides up to \$10K to the employer per apprentice
- 127 apprenticeships with over 40 employers across the state



TCSG institutions trained 45K+ employees over 4.4 million hours of work in AY 2022




# Higher Education

#### **University System of Georgia**

- 26 institutions with 389 facilities
- ~4% of students are duel enrolled
- Decrease in undergraduate awards, but 10% increase in graduate/professional degree awards, AY 2022

#### **Private Institutions**

- 24 institutions serving over 70K students
- +9% undergraduate enrollment
- +7% graduate enrollment

 Labor Force Participation rate highest in Metro Atlanta; 66%


